# DEACON'S DESK

Dear Quad Parishes Family:

The attitude of gratitude. Here is the lesson for us, taught by Jesus Himself.

It would be great, psychologically if we started each of our days with a great big "thank you Lord." Not everyone gets to wake up. What about when we come to breakfast, or grab a bagel on the way out, "thank you Lord Jesus for this bagel. I know that for many people, that bagel would be a whole day's meal." The attitude of gratitude. When we make it to work on time, safe, and whole, our car intact, "thank you Lord Jesus for sending my guardian angel before me to protect all those other drivers from my hurry."

Why am I talking about gratitude? It's the message of the Gospel. Leprosy was a terrible illness in those times. There was no treatment; they were simply ostracized to live together in misery. That's how it came to be that a Samaritan was living among the Judeans. They were all leprous outcasts. If Jesus was doing it for the poll numbers, He got a 10% in all the polls of gratitude. Only the Samaritan, of all people, came back to Him to thank Him for curing his disease.

These last two weeks have given me an attitude of gratitude. I am grateful I am no longer the parent of a 3 or 6 year old. By the way, the 6 year old has learned to say THE WORD THAT RHYMES WITH DUCK. It was not a happy mom and dad. I am grateful that Karen retired so we have some of the time we've always talked about. Don't be mistaken we are not zooming all over the planet. It's just nice to have someone in the seat next to you going the same way. Actually, because of the last two years, I'm just grateful for not falling asleep in a hospital bed!

I would highly recommend that you start your day with the attitude of gratitude. People look for different ways to pray; start with that small phrase and two things will occur: first, you will be more likely to start the day with a smile because you've moved away from how you feel to honoring the Author of Life. If you keep this up through the day, you are more likely to show the world that gratitude to the Lord is a "happy maker" you will evangelize with your smile. The second thing is that your mind will be turned to the Lord in a day full of little prayers of thanks. Who knows, you could end up being one of the 10% who remembers where this life really originates. By the way, 6 year old Tristan lost screens of any type for the school week. Now, if I could only get him to be grateful that his parents punished him for the word!

# Sisters' solar panels now draws 50% of their electrical power from sun

BAY SETTLEMENT - True to their religious community's founder, the Sisters of St. Francis of the Holy Cross continue to care for God's creation of Mother Earth. On Aug. 28, the sisters held a dedication and blessing of 280 solar panels located behind their motherhouse. Along with 416 panels that were installed in 2014, the community of 50 sisters now draws 50% of their convent's electrical power from the sun.

"The sisters are real educators," said Bishop David Ricken, who joined the sisters and special quests for the morning celebration and blessed the new panels with holy water, "Part of their charism as Franciscans is to follow the principles of St. Francis, who loved creation so much," he told The Compass. "So they are real educators in how we are using energy and making our lives more sustainable so the next generation can benefit."

Sr. Ann Rehrauer, community president, told guests in her

welcome address that --- thanks to grants from Focus on Energy (\$58,932) and RENEW Wisconsin's Solar for Good program (\$20,000), along with gifts from more than 30 donors and an estate gift - the new solar panels will allow the sisters to increase their solar energy output from 28% to 50% of their electrical needs.

"Our community strives every day to live more sustainably," said Sr. Rose Jochmann, who is chair of the community's sustainability committee. "We want to make choices that will use our earth's resources wisely and care for the earth."

Francis, whose feast day is Oct. 4, was born in Assisi in either in 1181 or 1182. He died on Oct. 3, 1226, and lies buried in the basilica named for him at Assisi.

2 Even though he was baptized "Giovanni," his father started calling him "Francesco," which meant "Frenchman."

3 Francis founded the Franciscans (Order of Friars Minor) and the Poor Clares (with St. Clare).

4 Francis' love of animals includes the tale of his preaching to birds, immortalized in Giotto's fresco: "The Sermon to the Birds."

5 Francis was the first person credited with receiving the stigmata, the wounds of Christ's crucifixion.

# Building a culture of missionary discipleship

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ:

 hree years ago, after consultation with my staff, and through the guidance of the Holy Spirit, I announced a new vision and

mission for the Diocese of Green Bay. This new vision and mission is centered on building families and communities of discipleship that discover Jesus, follow Jesus, worship Jesus and share Jesus with others. The vision and mission serve as

that discover Jesus, follow Jesus, worship Jesus and share Jesus with others. The vision and mission serve as our answer to why we do what we do, especially here in our diocesan offices, also known as the curia. As we began our work to

implement this new vision and mission, we recognized that we needed to embrace a new culture, a new way of being. So again, after prayer to the Holy Spirit, we wrote a culture statement and identified the core values that would guide our work. The culture and values speak to who we must become in order to bring this vision and mission to life.

The process to bring this culture to life has been ongoing over the past couple of years. Through training and development, we continue to grow in our understanding of the culture and we challenge each other daily to live our values. While bringing the culture to life is an ongoing process, I have witnessed a shift in our offices as we seek ways to explore potential, connect to inspire, embrace people's hearts, empower to act, and nurture abundant life and growth.

Having set this foundation, this past year we have started to focus even more on what we must do to bring our vision and mission to life and how we must do it. In other words, we began to shift our focus to strategy or mission planning. Just as many of our parishes are in the process of parish mission planning, within the diocesan offices we have begun a process of mission planning. We see these processes as mutually beneficial in that parish mission planning can inform and support curia mission planning, and curia mission planning can enhance and support parish mission planning.

Through this planning process, we recognized that our priority is to call forth and form leaders who love Jesus and live his mission. To help us do this, I recently announced to our staff two goals that I have set for us to achieve over the next five years.

Discipleship Goal: By 2025, we will call forth and form 1,000 missionary leaders who will mobilize 25,000 missionary disciples who disciple at least two others.

Vocations Goal: By 2025, we will call forth and form 30 seminarians to be missionary leaders in the priesthood.

Now some may be wondering, how did we arrive at these numbers? We recognized that if we are going to lead all people to the Kingdom of God, as our vision states, we must begin by reaching a critical mass that will tip the scales in building a culture of missionary discipleship.
