Normally, a distribution from your IRA is taxed as ordinary income. Tax legislation makes permanent a charitable giving opportunity throughout 2019 and into the future, for individuals 701/2 or older. You may make a direct distribution (up to \$100,000) from your IRA to a gualified charity, such as your parish, the Bishop's Appeal, the Catholic Foundation, or another charitable institution. Such qualified direct distributions to charity from your IRA are not subject to income tax and your gift will count against your required distribution, reducing your income and taxes.. These gifts must be processed prior to January 1. If you are considering a charitable gift to the parish, please make your gift as soon as possible to avoid any processing delays at the end of the month. For more information about how you and the Church can benefit from an IRA charitable rollover, contact your tax preparer, financial advisor or the Catholic Foundation for the Diocese of Green Bay at 920-272-8173; or e-mail at catholicfoundation@gbdioc.org. (PLEASE NOTE: This pertains to a Traditional IRA only; Roth IRA's do not qualify for this exemption).



Couple begins podcast to help connect Christ into today's secular culture

GREEN BAY — On one occasion, while listening to music in the car, Jake and Cathy Moore began analyzing the lyrics of the song that was playing. They broke down the message of the song in terms of their faith.

"We just had a really great conversation," said Cathy. "Jake said, 'We should do something with this. Someone should be recording us.""

The idea for the couple's podcast was formed. The mission for "TruthPop," which launched last spring, is "connecting Christ into culture." Most episodes feature Jake and Cathy analyzing pop songs, movies and television shows from a faith perspective.

For example, the song "Don't Give Up on Me" by Andy Grammar was the topic of the Oct. 3 episode. Songs by Halsey, Selena Gomez and Dierks Bentley were also among the music covered in season one of TruthPop. Both Jake and Cathy enjoy Christian music, but have focused on secular selections for the podcast.

"You don't have to just listen

to Christian music," said Jake. "There is truth in other music as well. I like the phrase, "You have to be in control of the medium, you can't let the medium control you." You have to ask yourself those deep questions; what music do I listen to and how is it affecting my life?"

Movies covered in the first season of the podcast include "Toy Story 4" and "Yesterday." "Throughout the week, we keep our eyes and ears open to music, TV shows or movies," said Cathy. "We bring ideas up to each other. Maybe we can pull a topic from it. To prepare for the show, we go over certain topics and have a rough draft. It's a relaxed plan."

Also found in Belgium is Beauraing, 2 Also found in Beigium is because where Mary appeared 33 times from Nov. 29, 1932, to Jan. 3, 1933. She appeared 8 times in Banneux from Jan. 15, 1933, to March 2, 1933.

Our Lady of Beauraing is also Our Lady of the Golden Heart.

The Beauraing apparitions were approved by the Bishop of Namur, Belgium, in July of 1949. Banneux was approved in August of 1949.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ:

few weeks ago, I traveled to Baltimore to attend meetings for the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops. These meetings,

which take place every year

in June and November, are an opportunity to gather with my brother bishops to discuss issues within the church in the United States. While several topics were addressed in our

time together, I found one particular conversation to be especially interesting and relevant to our efforts here in this diocese: building a culture of missionarv discipleship. Bishop Robert

Barron, who heads the Committee on Evangelization and Catechesis, shared some of the research the committee has done on the religiously unaffiliated, those often referred to as the "nones." Today, as many as 25% of Americans report that they are not affiliated with any particular religion; many are former Catholics. While these numbers are startling. Bishop Barron's message focused on how we can reach out and engage the unaffiliated, which should be one of our priorities as missionary disciples.

Specifically, he encouraged us to walk the paths of goodness, beauty and truth. Each of these paths presents opportunities to speak to the heart of people and draw them deeper into the richness of the faith. Finding goodness, beauty and truth in the world naturally leads

a person closer to God, who is goodness. beauty and truth.

Yet as I reflect on these three suggestions for reaching the nones, I recognize that we can't give what we don't have. So perhaps before we focus our efforts on others, we should take some time to rediscover goodness, beauty and truth in the world and in the church. The Advent and Christmas seasons provide ample opportunities to do so, and I'd like to offer some suggestions for you to consider.

This time of year is often known as the season of giving, and there are countless ways we can embrace this spirit of goodness. We can reach out to serve those in need in our communities by donating winter clothes, adopting a family and buying gifts, or volunteering at a shelter or a food pantry. Another way we can give is by spending time with people. Make it a point in our holiday gatherings to really be present to those around us, or take time to visit a friend, relative or even a stranger who is homebound or in a nursing home. Devoting ourselves to the humble service of others is a way to make the love of Christ known in the world.

The beauty of God is abundantly evident this time of year. One way we see this beauty is in the darkness and stillness of nature. Take a quiet walk and let yourself be captivated by the beauty of creation. Decorate your home and appreciate the way our churches are transformed to prepare for the coming of Jesus. Slow down and take note of the beautiful liturgies this time of year with their music. candles and colors.

There are no plans to cancel morning masses in case of severe weather; however, for safety reasons, be very conscientious about coming out in inclement weather. Your safety is of utmost importance and we cannot guarantee that parking lots will be cleared. Please use your best judgment. The Faith Formation Center, St. Patrick Food Pantry & Love Life will be closed when the schools close. Every attempt will be made to have the Quad-Parish offices open, but please call before coming since we may get in late or leave early. Our main concern is keeping everyone safe and we don't want you coming to the office if it is not open.

ATTN: SCRIP CARD USERS

When you pay with scrip or a gift card, do you sometimes have a small balance left on the card? Would you consider donating that card to those in need? We often get walk-ins requesting money to purchase gas, food, or prescriptions. The small balances left on your gift cards could add up to be enough to help someone have their next meal, pick-up a prescription, or purchase gas to get to a doctor appt, an out-of-town funeral, or to work the next day. Cards can be dropped in the collection baskets, or at the Quad-Parish or Faith Formation Office. It would be helpful if you would indicate the balance left on the card.

P R A Y E R V I N E

Do you have a special need for prayer? If you or someone you know needs a few extra prayers said for them, you can call the Quad-Parish Office at 496-2160.

It is not necessary to give names or specific details. Request examples: "Please pray for Sue (or 'a lady') that is going to Marshfield for testing" or "Please pray for my new grandson who was born two months premature."
