God At Work

Most of us can't even begin to appreciate the significance of this great feast of the Epiphany. Since Adam and Eve's fall, God has been working on a plan of redemption that we humans might just recognize, so we can once again be reunited to our God, who is infinite LOVE.

Centuries ago God chose to work through one nation that was to serve as the big brother to all the nations. But over time the Israelites misinterpreted God's work with them. By the time of the Incarnation the Jews believed the Messiah would be like their great King David and would free them from Roman and foreign domination.

The King Herod that was ruling at this time was more than a little nervous when the magi appeared in his court looking for a new born king. His cage was so rattled! He was greatly troubled! Did you notice he assembled the whole gang, the chief priests and the scribes, to discuss his problem?

Secretly, Herod met with the magi to determine exactly when that star first appeared. In addition he demanded the magi come back to him after they found this new born king so that he too could worship him. What he really wanted to know was where he could find this baby, this enemy and threat to his throne!

Why did God attract the attention of the magi in the first place? Because God's plan didn't include sending a mighty warrior to slaughter Israel's enemy, Rome, and make Israel top dog. God's plan was to reveal His great love for us and His immense desire that all humans grasp the mystery that we are made in the image and likeness of this unconditional, compassionate, all loving Holy One. This God wants all people to be with the Trinity forever.

Like the magi God works with each of us, giving us signs through people and events in our lives, which help us realize all creation is blessed and has a final destination far beyond our imaginations. God intended all along that we should work with Jesus in building the kingdom that is not of this world, but of heaven and is the beginning of a new earth in a new age that will last eternity.

Take some time this week to reflect on today's gospel and ask yourself where your faith is leading you. When we encounter our living God, we change and like the magi we take a different route. Where is your new route heading?



Come judge for yourself. All are welcome, it's free, and popcorn and other treats are a bonus.


New Hope Bereavement Group

JESUS, THE IMMIGRANT

Last Sunday, December 29th, was Jesus flight into Egypt to escape Herod's killing of the first born boys. Jesus and the Holy Family will stay in Egypt as migrants. I read an article written by *Denise C. Koenig about "What the Bible says about Refugee*'s.

Please read and pray about this.

We use many different terms today for what the Bible calls strangers, foreigners, and sojourners. Here are a few:

• **Displaced persons** — those who have been forced to leave their homes (community) due to violent conflict, war, or a natural disaster. These people temporarily live in another community in their country and usually return home when things improve.

• **Refugees** — people who have been forced to leave their nation due to violent conflict or war. These people want to return to their country once the war or conflict is over. These situations often lead to years of displacement.

• **Migrants** — those who have chosen to leave their home country, mainly to escape poverty. These people are making a permanent move and would not return unless conditions improved significantly.

• Immigrants — very similar to "migrant." Someone who moves to another country for any number of reasons, including marriage or other family ties, employment/ business opportunity, etc. Some distinguish between immigrants with legal papers to enter a country and those without legal permission. This would not have been a consideration in Bible times.

• **Asylum seekers** — individuals who ask to live in another country to escape severe religious or political persecution or another violation of their human rights. These people would not return home unless the reason for their move came to an end.

• **Stateless persons** — those who are not a citizen under the laws of any country. People can become stateless in many ways, such as when a country ceases to exist or when a country adopts discriminatory laws that do not recognize certain ethnic groups within its borders.

• **Visitors** — people coming into a country or community for a defined time. Some come for a vacation or sabbatical. Others come for an education. These individuals return home when that time period is over.

There are principles in God's Word about how his people are to treat strangers or foreigners.

Jesus said how his followers treated strangers should show disciple-like behavior.

... I was a stranger and you invited me in.—*Matthew 25:35* Jesus follows the Old Testament pattern and takes it a step further by saying that how we treat strangers indicates whether we are his followers. We are to invite the stranger in if we are his disciples.

Foreigners or refugees are not to be oppressed.

Do not oppress a foreigner; you yourselves know how it feels to be foreigners, because you were foreigners in Egypt.— *Exodus 23:9*

The Israelites knew how it *felt* to be a foreigner. They were to call on their empathy for refugees because they had been treated cruelly as refugees who were made into slaves in Egypt.

And since we, as believers, were once strangers outside God's kingdom, we can identify with the idea of not belonging as the reason why we treat refugees or displaced people without discrimination.

Treat foreigners or refugees as citizens and with love.

The foreigners residing among you must be treated as <u>mative-born</u>. Love them as yourself, for you were foreigners in Egypt. I am the Lord your God.—*Leviticus 19:34*

Make foreigners part of the community.

Miscellaneous instructions in the Law made sure foreigners were included in the Jewish community. They included provisions for them to be treated equally under the law and to be included in festivals and celebrations of the community.

• Cities of refuge were available to Israelites and foreigners in cases of accidental murder (Numbers 35:15).

• Foreigners were to be included in festivals & celebrations mandated in the Law (Deuteronomy 16:14; 26:11).

• Some of the tithe collected by the priests was to be used to not only feed them and their families, but also to help provide food for foreigners, widows, and orphans (Deuteronomy 14:28-29).

• Also, farmers were instructed to leave the gleanings of their fields for the poor and the foreigner (Leviticus 23:22). And to treat the stranger as they would the poor among the Israelites (Leviticus 25:35).

Notice the last two points were about providing for displaced people's needs, especially food. The truth, even today, is that people come to live in another country for a variety of reasons & with a variety of resources in their hands.

All believers are to show hospitality to strangers. Keep on loving one another as brothers and sisters. Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers for by doing that some have shown hospitality to angels without knowing it. —*Hebrews 13:1-2*

All believers are strangers on Earth.

... live out your time as foreigners here with reverent fear. -1 *Peter 1:17*

This is a principle for God's people of all times. Moses instructed the Israelites not to sell any of the land permanently, because the land belonged to God and they were only foreigners living there (Leviticus 25:23).

Think of how graciously God treats us, the foreigners living in his world. His kindness to us can guide our thoughts and actions towards those living as strangers among us.

All believers in Jesus Christ belong to the kingdom of God. Consequently, you are no longer foreigners and strangers, but fellow citizens with God's people and also members of his household.—*Ephesians 2:19*

This verse follows the great passage that lays out how we have been saved by faith in Jesus (2:8-10). In it, the terms "foreigners" and "strangers" are used as metaphors for our condition before our faith in Jesus Christ. Before we believed, we were outside the covenant and considered foreigners or strangers in God's kingdom (2:11-13). But because of our faith in him, we are now part of God's community — strangers who have been welcomed in.



Norman Miller Center, Quad Parishes partner for social justice series

St. Norbert students give talks at St. Joseph Church in Green Bay

GREEN BAY — St. Norbert College students Natalie Bradish and Leah Jobe are thankful to serve as community organizers for the Norman Miller Center for Peace, Justice and Understanding.

"We have the best jobs in the world," said Bradish, who is from Appleton. "We help out with organizing events. We recently had Las Cafeteras (a Los Angeles-based band that uses music to bridge cultures). We help plan, coordinate schedules, meet them, take them where they need to be and help set up."

While much of the mission of the center — to cultivate "awareness, compassion and commitment to justice and the building of sustainable peace" — involves events and initiatives on campus, the staff welcomes opportunities to serve the greater community.

This year, Bradish and Jobe took on a project through a partnership with the Quad Parishes (Annunciation, St. Jude, St. Joseph and St. Patrick) on Green Bay's west side. In October, they launched a series of presentations on Catholic social teaching, held in the chapel at St. Joseph Church. The first session addressed "Climate Change and Its Effects on Immigration." The November presentation tackled "Immigration Laws."

The idea for the project originated last winter when the Norman Miller Center was approached by a representative from the Quad Parishes, explained Bob Pyne, senior director of the center. He consulted with a leadership team from the parishes about ways to promote justice work in the community.

"Deacon Jerry (Coenen) was at the meeting and he and I met again a few weeks later," said Pyne. "He told me about his desire to host a series of talks on social justice and Catholic social teaching, potentially aimed at seniors in the community.

"Several of our student community organizers at the Norman Miller Center took ownership of the idea from there," he added. "They have chosen the topics and developed the presentations on their own. We are proud of them and happy that the program has taken off."

The students did research for the presentations. At the November session, Jobe, who is from Tigerton, covered President Donald Trump's executive orders that focus on border security. She provided numerous statistics and sources. For example, Jobe broke down the number of border agents called for by President Trump. He signed an order for an additional 5,000 agents. That would bring the total to approximately 25,000.

Jobe also shared statistics about the proposed border wall, which would serve as a U.S.-Mexico barrier. She provided information from sources indicating that 650 miles of fencing is currently on the border. That leaves 1,300 open miles.

Jobe showed a video as part of the presentation about how some of the rugged terrain in south Texas, featuring cliffs as high as 1,000 feet, creates a natural border and would provide a construction challenge in that region.

Bradish provided information about life in countries that are southern neighbors to the U.S. and the rise in immigration. She once visited Guatemala for five weeks through a program offered by the college.

To demonstrate the growth in immigration, Bradish shared that there were less than 1 million Latin American-born U.S. residents in 1960. In 2010, that number had climbed to 19 million. She spoke about "push factors" driving migration, including poverty, violence and discrimination.

"Latin America's homicide rate is 3 times that of the global average," she said. "In Mexico & Venezuela, half of the citizens reported experiencing a violent crime in the last year."

Deacon Coenen helps facilitate the sessions. He served in both Texas and California and started a mission in Mexico. He helped with the development of schools, but the children in the community were not required to attend.

"Those kids don't have to go to school," he said. "There were 1,000 families. They were not educated and didn't have jobs. If they got a job it was usually for \$5 a day. That was the going wage. Drinking water in Mexico is still \$1.50 a bottle even if you make \$5 a day. They would drink clean water, but they would have trucks of dirty water come in so they could bathe and do the dishes. It breeds sickness."

Deacon Coenen added that the people would rather stay with their families than migrate to other countries if they could live safe and healthy lives.

"It's hard,' he said. "I think as Catholics, we have to realize that they are our brothers and sisters. What can we do besides pray? We are trying to help. I thank these two young people for their research. It's up for us as a community to react in the right way."

Bradish, a biology major, is graduating at semester. Jobe, a psychology and communications major, will continue the presentations in 2020 with another staff member from the Norman Miller Center.

"I want them to gain confidence in their knowledge and presentation skills," said Pyne, "and I want them to have fun working together for a good cause alongside community members. We always say that our service programs should create positive change in the community, create positive change in the student participants and bring that change back to campus for the rest of us to enjoy."

"It is really good to formulate our own information and develop our skills speaking in front of people," said Bradish. "We are still learning. This helps us."
